## The International Council on Pastoral Care and Counselling - ICPCC

is an organization of women and men desiring to respond to current needs and situations faced by people and communities in the world through pastoral care and counselling. ICPCC exists for education and empowerment of persons and groups in the practice of pastoral care and counselling.

ICPCC's mission is

- To promote the reflective practice of pastoral care and counselling throughout the world.
- To inform, educate and inspire practitioners of pastoral care and counselling in various contexts in the world.
- To enable practitioners of pastoral care and counselling to be resources for one another and to learn from each other's cultures, traditions and practices.
- To support and advocate for the unique and essential dimension of spirituality in the teaching and practice of pastoral care and counselling.
- To develop relevant theories in the field of pastoral care and counselling and to this end to engage in interdisciplinary discourse.
- To organize and assist in the organizing of conferences, consultations and meetings in various areas of the world.
- To support the development of counselling centres and organizations for pastoral care and counselling in various parts of the world.
- To increase interaction with other care and counseling organizations.

The ICPCC draws its membership from a diverse movement of persons and communities involved in spiritual, pastoral and religious care and counseling. The ICPCC organization consists of a Council, a Coordinating Committee and an Executive.

The International Council came into existence in 1979 at the first International Congress of reflective practitioners of Pastoral Care and Counselling held in Edinburgh, Scotland. There had been gatherings from as early as 1972 of various European and American practitioners but Edinburgh 1979, where over four hundred people from all the continents gathered, was a watershed for Pastoral Care and Counselling.

The Council serves as a 'web-like' network of people elected at each International Congress every four years to help to:

- Promote the reflective practice of Pastoral Care and Counselling throughout the world
- Inform, educate and inspire practitioners of Pastoral Care and Counselling in every place
- Enable practitioners to be in touch with each other and to learn from good practice wherever it occurs.

The Council has overseen the running of International Congresses every four years. There have been seven so far:

### ***Rituals of Encounters in Healing: Pastoral Care and Counselling, in Rotorua, Aotearoa/New Zealand in August 2011.***

*We chose this theme based on the model on the front page (Durie, 1984) of a traditional Maori meeting house and the rituals of encounter we use there to welcome guests into the whare/house. The model demonstrates health and well-being as a four-dimensional holistic and spiritual treasure to be acknowledged and nurtured. Fundamental to Maori health is the health of our land and our relationship to our land is how we identify ourselves. Our traditional welcome signifies to both host and guest that the encounter ritual we engage in is a sacred exchange of both self and soul. Without these rituals of encounters, the acknowledgement of the twin treasures of life and soul that each of us holds within ourselves cannot safely be shared with others in a healing relationship.*

***We are looking forward to welcoming you to our land and hearing about  
your encounter rituals for healing.***

#### ***Te Taha Tinana*** (Physical well-being)

*The most familiar dimension in healing is the physical; for Maori, physical wellbeing of both land and body are desirable.*

#### ***Te Taha Wairua*** (Spiritual well-being)

*Spirituality is acknowledged to be the most essential requirement for health. It is believed that without a spiritual awareness an individual can be considered to be lacking in wellbeing and more prone to ill health.*

#### ***Te Taha Hinengaro*** (Mental & Emotional well-being)

*Thoughts, feelings and resultant behaviours are vital to health in Te Ao Maori (the Maori world). Communication through emotions is important and more meaningful than the exchange of words.*

#### ***Te Taha Whanau*** (Family & Social well-being)

*Family is the prime support system providing care, not only physically but also culturally and emotionally. For Maori, whanau is about extended relationships rather than the western family concept.*

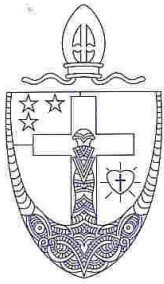

### **Invitation to hold ICPC 2011 in Aotearoa – New Zealand.**

First of all I convey my prayers to the 2007 International Council on Pastoral Care and Counselling which is now being convened in Krzyzowa, Poland. May the gathering be blessed and may it reach a fruitful and meaningful conclusion.

The work of ICPC is not a new concept to us as the Reverend Jim Biddle has kept us informed since attending his first congress in Ghana, West Africa in August 1999, and then Bangalore, India in August 2004.

At the Congress held in Bangalore, India in August of 2004 the Reverend Jim Biddle representing Te Taapapa ki te Manawa o te Wheke, our indigenous Theological Educational Unit based in Rotorua, tabled a letter of invitation for the ICPC to hold its 2011 International Congress in Aotearoa / New Zealand.

At the time of the Ghana, South African Congress I had just concluded six years as the Maori Anglican Chaplain in Sydney, Australia where I ministered to all Maori, regardless of Church affiliation. I returned to New Zealand just over six years ago and last August was ordained Bishop of Te Manawa o Te Wheke.

As the Bishop under whose Episcopal authority the Te Taapapa ki te Manawa o te Wheke, based in Rotorua is placed, I do now write to indicate my support for the ICPC 2011 to be held in Aotearoa – New Zealand and in particular in Rotorua.

It is my understanding that in January 2006 Jim brought you and family / friends to Te Taapapa ki te Manawa o te Wheke in Rotorua (his workplace) and that you also journeyed to St Faiths Anglican Church and the marae on the Rotorua lakefront.

I am pleased that you were able to do this as Rotorua is where I was born and raised. St Faiths was also the parish in which I served before taking up my post in Australia. Not only is it my home, but as one of the indigenous Bishops in this beautiful country of Aotearoa – New Zealand it is also one of my cities of Episcopal responsibility.

I am but one of five indigenous Bishops in Aotearoa, one of which is the Archbishop Brown Turei. As such this invitation can be seen as a combined invitation of Tikanga Maori.

Jim and I have discussed some possibilities as to partnerships for the 2011 Congress and as such Jim has done much networking in this country prior to coming to Germany / Poland.

Whilst there are a number of people and groups showing a genuine interest and signified their full support, Jim has indicated that Reverend Charles Waldegrave of the Lower Hutt Family Centre has signaled clearly that he would be willing to be involved and proactive in support of the 2011 Congress being held in Rotorua New Zealand.

I appreciate and affirm this aspect.

## Key lecturers



**PROFESSOR DR NALINI ARLES:**

*Professor of Pastoral Care and Counselling – United Theological College – Bangalore India.*

Nalini is the current president of ICPC and has been active at congresses and on the council since 1991, as well as the Asia Pacific council for pastoral care and counselling and the Society for Intercultural Pastoral care and counselling. She has been Vice-Chair of ICPC in her former term of office and was the Convenor of the 2004-Bangalore 7<sup>th</sup> World Congress of ICPC. Nalini is a member of the church of the South India (Karnataka) central diocese and her teaching role includes chairing the Christian ministry department and co-ordinating the one year diploma program in proficiency counselling. Prior to teaching she served as a chaplain in the Christian Medical College and hospital in Vellore. Nalini's experiences as a member and counsellor among the Dalit caste have informed much of her practice and teaching. She will offer an opening presentation addressing aspects of *Te Taha Wairua* - Human "ensoulment" – the spiritual dimension in healing pastoral care and counselling



**REV'D DR CHARLES WALDGRAVE:**

*Pakeha Co-ordinator: Family Centre, Lower Hutt, Wellington, New Zealand.*

Charles is a psychologist, family therapist and Anglican Priest. He leads the Centre's Social Policy Research Unit and is joint leader of the NZ Poverty Measurement Project, which has provided the evidence base for considerable public policy debate and social and economic change in N.Z. he co-leads the N.Z. Longitudinal Study of Aging research program and is one of the founders of "Just Therapy", an internationally recognized approach to addressing cultural, gender and socioeconomic contexts in therapy. He has published extensively and conducts workshops and education internationally.

Together with the late Canon Rev'd Jim Biddle he extended the Bishop's invitation to host the 9<sup>th</sup> ICPC World Congress in Rotorua, during the proceedings of the 2007 ICPC-meeting and Congress in Dresden/Gemany and Krzyzowa/Poland. With members of the Family Centre team, presentations at Congress will address matter concerning *Te Taha Whanau*, Family Well-being: the social, relational and ecological network/environment – systemic dimensions in healing, pastoral care and counselling.



**PROFESSOR DR. DANIEL LOUW**

*Professor in Practical Theology, Practical Theology, Pastoral Care and Counselling, at Stellenbosch University, South Africa. (Retired 2010 )*

Daniel is currently Vice President of the ICPC. Alongside his academic life, Daniel has been active as director and founder of the African network for Higher Education and Research in Theology and HIV, established with the University of Makumira, Tanzania, the Ethiopian Graduate School of Theology in Addis Ababa and the Swedish church. Through liaison and networking with theological institutions in Africa, its task is to offer professional training to ministers and pastoral care workers in such a way as to link theological education and community development, attending to the impact of context and interculturalization.



**PROFESSOR SIR MASON DURIE, KNZM, FRSNZ, FRANZCP**

*Deputy Vice- Chancellor & Professor of Psychiatry & Research academic at Massey University. Rangitane, Ngati Kauwhata, Ngati Raukawa*

Professor Durie has been at the forefront of a transformational approach to Maori health for the past forty years. His conceptual framework of *Whare Tapa Wha* underpins the theme of our congress and its four pillars were developed from the philosophy that inherent in Maori development are autonomy, and the integration of social, cultural and economic dimensions. He is an advocate for higher education for Maori and assists Iwi and Maori communities to realize their aspirations for socio-economic advancement. He is active in many community and statutory health organizations including the National Health Committee, the Mental Health Foundation and the Alcohol Advisory Council. He has been recognized by many groups for his contributions and was knighted in 2010 for services to Public and Maori health.



**PROFESSOR DR JAMES FARRIS**

*Professor of Practical Theology and Religion and Psychology, Methodist School of Theology and Graduate School of Religion, Methodist University of Sao Paulo, Brazil.*

James is an ordained Methodist minister and psychologist, active within the ICPC, the American Association of Pastoral Counsellors, the Society for Intercultural Pastoral Care & Counselling, the International Pastoral Care Network for Social Responsibility, the Brazilian Counselling Association, and the Brazilian Society for the Study of Sexuality. In 2002 he published *“International Perspectives on Pastoral Counselling”*. He conducts research in the area of Religion & Sexuality and is particularly interested in questions of Religious ethics, human sexual behaviour and power and gender. He co-ordinates the interdisciplinary research group Religion and Psychology at the university.
